







# CLIMATE CHANGE AND THE CHALLENGES FOR PUBLIC HEALTH: ENGAGING THE REGIONS

Climate change is the leading public health challenge of the 21st century. Climate related extreme weather events, flooding, droughts, and temperature changes already put severe pressure on health systems. To avoid the worst of these effects Europe needs to take action now.

Through local adaptation and mitigation initiatives European regions are ideally placed to reduce vulnerability to future climate change and also take advantage of the co-benefits to health of measures to curb greenhouse gas emissions (GHG), such as increased exercise, reduced air, water and noise pollution and fewer accidents and injuries. That's why the Health and Environment Alliance (HEAL) and EUropean REGional Local Health Authorities (EUREGHA) network, supported by the Committee of the Regions (CoR), and the Veneto and the North West of England regions, are co-organising this one day conference on health, climate change and regional engagement.

The specific purposes of the conference are to:

- Outline the European and international climate change policy framework
- Increase understanding of the health risks of climate change
- Showcase regional adaptation and mitigation initiatives and empower local institutions to take action on climate change and simultaneously protect health
- Debate climate policy recommendations

**Target audience**: local and regional environment and health authorities, the public health community (health professionals, patient groups, and health care managers), international, EU and national policy-makers; and interested NGOs.
